AMANDA LOMBARDI LOMBARDI BROS, MAX GREEN & CO & MODERN COLLISION, WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

Role in the company:

Operations manager for Max Greens and Lombardi Bros. Invoicing, overseeing profit, delegating roles to office staff, overseeing relationships with dealerships and all insurance company staff. At Modern Collision, Amanda organises work flow and oversees sourcing insurance work.

Amanda Lombardi remembers shouting over the workshop tannoy for her dad John to get her some chocolate when she was just five years old, she loved being around cars from an early age. She began her working life at a stock broking company but when her parents

offered to take her on a three month holiday to Italy she didn't want to miss out and while she was waiting for the trip, started to help out in the Lombardi office. She had just turned 17 and she's been there ever since.

Being a pretty, petite blonde was not advantageous for being taken seriously in such a male dominated industry.

Lombardi's has a fine heritage of repairing prestige cars. The dealers were nervous about handing of the keys to her in the early days: "Which is ridiculous because a young female driver would generally drive an exotic supercar extra carefully and be less of a liability than a young lad," she said.

A love of cars is of course an advantage in this business but it took a long time for dealership staff and customers to get their heads around Amanda having the expertise to quote for repairs, but now many customers only want to deal with her.

Her father John and uncle Frank, who celebrated 40 years in business together in 2012, have been an invaluable learning source. Amanda says she learns something new every day from John who is so steeped in industry know-how and knowledge.

NICKY SLATTERY CRANBOURNE BODYWORKS, VICTORIA

Role in the company:

Nicky runs the the shop with her husband Kevin. As operations manager she is responsible for production control and management, managing the organisation's human resources, sales and marketing and financial management.

'Ensuring organisational effectiveness by providing leadership for the financial functions of the business, along with the development and implementation of organisational strategies, policies and practices' is how Nicky describes her primary function at Cranbourne Bodyworks.
